4. **Description of the initiative**

- a. Please provide a brief summary of the initiative (no more than 75 words):

In January 2019, the Data Protection Commission (DPC) launched a special public consultation to give children and young people the opportunity to have their say on issues around children's data protection rights in a social media context. The DPC created a dedicated lesson plan on personal data and data protection rights, and invited every school and Youthreach Centre in Ireland to participate in this consultation through the delivery by teachers of this unique lesson plan.

The aim of the DPC's public consultation and lesson plan materials is to promote broad awareness of children's data protection issues, as per Article 57 of the GDPR, and to drive

higher standards of protection across all sectors where children’s personal data is processed. Furthermore, the DPC wanted to respect the fundamental right of children under Article 12 of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child to express their opinion on issues that affect them and we were excited to give children and young people the opportunity to have their say on matters that relate specifically to them.

The DPC liaised with experts in the field of child safety and child protection, such as the Irish Ombudsman for Children’s Office², Special Rapporteur on Child Protection Dr Geoffrey Shannon, and CyberSafelreland³ to discuss the best and most appropriate methods for consulting with children on these important issues.

The DPC created a unique pack of teaching materials, which aim to help teachers to explore with their students the concept of personal data and data protection rights (e.g. the right to be informed, access and erasure) in the context of using a fictitious social media app called *SquadShare*⁴. This, in turn, enabled students to contribute to our public consultation by providing their opinions on key issues.

The lesson plan pack included: (1) A video message from Commissioner for Data Protection, Helen Dixon, explaining why the DPC was running this consultation and how students could get involved, (2) a Quick-Start Guide to Data Protection for Teachers, (3) a 2-hour lesson plan with 3 different activities and discussion points tailored to 3 different age groups, (4) a lesson plan slideshow, and (5) a set of 6 PDF feedback posters that teachers could use to record the opinions of their students in response to the questions set out on the posters.

The DPC has published a report on this child-focused consultation in the form of a thematic analysis of all feedback from children and young people (link under Item (e) below), and this report will be followed by substantive guidance.

- c. Please explain why you think the initiative deserves to be recognised by an award (no more than 200 words)

The DPC has created an innovative lesson plan, which educates children about their data protection rights. We rigorously tested the efficacy of these materials with the help of the Ombudsman for Children’s Office, by coordinating three pilot workshops with groups of children across three different age groups.

With this tailored lesson plan, the DPC has given young people in Ireland the opportunity to have their voices heard about important data protection issues that affect them directly, and the DPC is unique in this regard. As far as we are aware, we are the only international Data Protection Authority to have consulted with young people on data protection issues by reaching out directly to every single school and Youthreach centre in the country (approx. 4000 schools in Ireland) to invite them to participate in our consultation.

In total, we heard from approximately 1200 children across Ireland and received very positive feedback from teachers who found the lesson plan materials to be “*very worthwhile*” and “*so*

informative and insightful”, stating that their students were “very animated and interested throughout” and “thoroughly enjoyed completing these lessons”.

Our consultation initiative has also been highlighted by the ICDPPC Digital Education Working Group (DEWG) as a core international initiative being carried out in line with Action 2 of the DEWG’s Action Plan, namely “Awareness-raising on the exercise of digital rights by the children themselves”.



Schools throughout the State are to be given the opportunity to take part in a public consultation on children's data protection rights.

The consultation launched by the Data Protection Commission on Wednesday will run until March 1st, 2019 and will have two strands – one aimed at adults and the other at children.

It will examine issues relating to the processing of children's personal data and their rights as "data subjects" under the EU General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR).

Irish DPC launches public consultation of children's data rights

The Irish Data Protection Commission has launched a public consultation on children's data protection rights under the EU General Data Protection Regulation, *The Irish Times* reports. The consultation will have two parts: one focused on children and another focused on adults. The DPC seeks submissions from students, parents, educators and organizations that process children's information. The agency will take the responses it receives from children and adults to create guidance materials, as well as work with various stakeholders to produce best practices for when children's data is processed. The consultation will run until 1 March.
